VISITOR FACILITATION CENTER AT SATPAL ARBORETUM

K. Aggarwal, IFS, Chief Conservator of Forests & MD GFDC and other senior Forest Officers.

Satpal Arboretum was established in 1974 over an area of 24.50 hectares. The arboretum consists of 82 plots of different species of trees. An arboretum is an area where different kinds of trees, shrubs, vines, etc are grown for study and research. An arboretum differs from a botanical garden in that the emphasis is placed on the growing of a particular kind of plants, whereas in a botanical garden, all types of plants and trees are grown.

The trees and plants grown at Satpal Arboretum includes 13 species of bamboos, numerous medicinal plants, shrubs and herbs. Apart from these, different plots having plants specific to ancient Indian philosophy and mythology have been developed in order to sensitise the visitors of India's rich heritage.

The Arboretum is geometrically laid out into over 80 plots of equal area and each plot is planted with a specific species of plant or tree species. It also has several subject specific plots like Rashi Nakshatra Van, Swasthya Van, Navagraha Van, Saptarishi Van, Medicinal Plants, Cactus House, etc. which is ideal for school and college students for study.

The Visitor Facilitation Centre was constructed by the Forest Department to provide basic facilities for visiting students and members of the public during their study at the Arboretum.





HIPPOPOTAMUS PAIR ARRIVE AT BONDLA ZOO Part of exchange program with Mysore Zoo



Jondla Zoo has added a pair of Hippopotamus to its collection. The pair were brought from Mysore Zoo by a team of Officers from Goa. The transportation team consisted of Mr. Vishwas Chodankar, RFO of Bondla Zoo along with Dr. Satyavan Naik, Veterinary Officer from Department of Animal Husbandry & Veterinary Sciences.

Hippopotamus are exotic herbivorous animals native of the African continent. They are huge and ferocious animals and in spite of their bulk are known to sprint short distances at considerable speed.

They spend much of their day life under water surfacing occasionally for breathing and during night time. They feed both above and under water and can actually walk on the ground under water for feeding on aquatic plant life.

The hippopotamus pair at Bondla are less than a year old and have been bred at Mysore Zoo. The male has been named Devidas and the female as Saundarya by the Mysore Zoo authorities and they continue under the same name at Bondla Zoo.

The staff at Bondla Zoo take pride in the addition to the Zoo and are taking special care to make the animals feel at home. They are presently kept under quarantine and may be placed for public viewing shortly.

The number of visitors to the Zoo has increased considerably over the last few years because of the spurt of addition of new animals to the Zoo collection.

There have been addition of a pair of Tigers followed by colourful pheasants and now the pair of Hippopotamus. With the development of the Master Plan for Bondla Zoo over the next ten years, the Zoo has been a site for hectic activity both from the management perspective as well as from the perspective of conservation education. The various theme based plots like Nakshatra Van, Saptarishi Van, Medicinal Plants plots etc are also described in the brochure.

Strangers in the Night by Benhail Antao



few years ago I had gone camping along the Western Ghats of India. As I recall, it was a cold winter's night, when I decided to set out to explore the jungle around me.

It was buzzing with sounds of various insects and other nocturnal creatures. A Night Jar was perched in the foliage above, close enough for me to hear it, but camouflaged well enough to be out of sight.

As I continued to walk along the forest I noticed a narrow trail ahead of me almost a glow under the light of the full moon.

I could feel a gentle warm breeze through the forest giving it an air of almost surreal calmness. Suddenly I heard a strange noise in the foliage above me. Instinctively I looked upwards. At first I saw nothing. But then when I looked closer, I saw a pair of large closely set brown eyes.

My heart raced and I couldn't believe my luck as I realised what I was looking at was an extremely rare little creature and quite definitely one on our endangered species list , known as the Slender Loris (Louis Tarrdigradus).

This incredibly cute, small primate could easily fit into the palm of your hand. However few people know that these little creatures used to send shivers down the spines of hunters from indigenous tribes in the Ghats as it was said to bring bad luck during their hunt. This worked for a while till people got the wiser and realized how fragile these creatures are. Then they began to kill them on sight which led to a fall in their population. Deforestation and mining over the years has taken a huge toll on the Slender Loris making their chances for survival quite slender indeed.

The Slender Loris is now restricted to small patches of Southern India and Sri Lanka. It is a nocturnal primate that is arboreal, which means that its habitat is restricted to the foliage of trees. It is found to grow upto 25cm long, and weighs upto 250grams.

During the day they sleep high in the trees in the forks of branches, curled up with their heads between their legs. As night sets in, they move out in search of food. They are mostly insectivorous though they have been known to feed on slugs, worms, tree sap/gum, the eggs of small birds and sometimes even on small vertebrates like lizards.

Their cute and cuddly disposition has in fact turned out to be their downfall as they have fallen prey to poachers and smugglers who have found a handsome price for them in the exotic pet trade racket.

In places like china they are said to posses medicinal powers. Though this is entirely untrue, it has led to the Slender Loris being forced almost to the very brink of survival.

The Slender Loris is now protected under the Schedule 1 of the Wildlife Protection Act of India of 1972.

WORLD FORESTRY DAY CELEBRATED

Programmes arranged at Pissonem and Ponda



The Forest Department organised programs to mark the World Forestry Day at Ponda and Pissonem. A seminar was organised at the Conference Hall of the Goa Forest Department on Biodiversity of the Western Ghats.

An eminent environmentalist Mr. Nirmal Kulkarni was invited to make a presentation. During his presentation, Mr. Kulkarni gave special emphasis of the lesser known fauna of the Chorla Ghat region of Mhadei Wildlife Sanctuary.

The programs were supplemented by inviting Resource Persons from various fields of wildlife and nature conservation. Mementos were also distributed to the participating children with clear message of need for conservation.




REFRESHER COURSE FOR FOREST OFFICERS


